# SCHOOLS APPOINT NEW DIRECTOR OF CURRICULUM

The Board of Education has named Dr. Evelyn Russo the new Director of Curriculum, Instruction, and Personnel for the Orange Public Schools. # TOWN REJECTS APARTMENT DEVELOPMENT AT FIRELITE

The Orange Plan and Zoning Commission denied an application from Roeco, a New York developer looking to build a four- to five-story mixed use plaza with stores, offices and 119 apartments at its January 19 meeting.

The Commission held a public hearing on a petition to amend the Orange zoning regulations and revisions to the Orange parking regulations. There was an associated petition to amend the town zoning map to change the property at 35 Old Tavern Rd. – now the Firelite Shopping Center – from a local shopping center district to a town center district. After a two hour discussion, P&Z Commission Chair Beau Clark said, "When I look at the regulation, the first thing that struck me is that this would be an allowed use as opposed to a special use where we would have that additional layer of discretion."

Clark said, "This regulation is not in the best interest in the town of Orange and, more importantly, is not consistent with the Plan of Conservation and Development that we just adopted. I've never seen an applicant where the regulation would allow them to build 19 units per acre and they only want to build 18, or that they are allowed to build five stories, but they only want to build four. I question the motive behind that part of it.

"I cannot see a 30,000 square foot retail space, plus the office space that's

# FAIRLEIGH DICKINSON NAMES ORANGE RESIDENT AS PRESIDENT

The Board of Trustees of Fairleigh Dickinson University (FDU) is pleased to announce that Dr. Christopher A. Capuano, currently the University

provost and senior vice president for academic affairs and the University's second ranking officer, has been appointed the University's next president. Capuano, 57, will serve as president-elect during the 2015-2016 academic year and will become the University's eighth president on July 1,

2016, when current President Sheldon Drucker will retire. Chris was a student that went through the Orange school system and a graduate of Amity 1975. His Parents Nina and Tony Capuano still reside on Augusta Drive in Orange and are proud of this accomplishment.

Board Chair Patrick Zenner said that "the University is fortunate to have such a strong candidate for the presidency within its ranks, someone who has served the University well as a faculty member and administrator, has been a passionate and determined leader of the faculty in his current role as chief academic officer, and has worked closely with President Drucker, the Board and the University community on numerous initiatives of significant importance to the University, including its new stra-

tegic plan." Zenner added "Dr. Capuano has been a tireless and effective advocate for FDU in his current and former positions at the University, and the Board has complete confidence in his ability to lead the University as its next chief executive officer."

Capuano stated that he is "deeply

honored and appreciative of the Board's decision to appoint him the next president of such an outstanding university, a university with an extraordinary mission, history and increasing global reach." In accepting this appointment, he said that he is "most excited about the opportunity to lead a very talented and deeply committed faculty, staff and student body, all of which are necessary to propel the University to an even greater level of distinction and enable FDU to better serve its communities."

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# **ORANGE RESIDENT BLOSVEREN** TO RETIRE AS LIBRARY DIRECTOR

Stratford Library Director Barbara Blosveren will retire in February. The Orange Resident has been at the Library for 33 years; the last nine as its director. Prior to that role she was Assistant Director, Senior Manager for Personnel and Youth Services and Young Adult Department Head. In making the announcement, Library Board President Judith Hampel said, "Barbara has made a significant contribution over the years to the library. Her creativity and leadership have clearly played a role in making the library the essential town asset it has become."

Barbara Blosveren was responsible for creating the nationally recognized and award-winning Teen Services Department at the Stratford Library. She established the library's monthly Youth Review Board in 1987, a program which continues to provide young people with the opportunity to share ideas, impressions and critical evaluations of the books they read. The Youth Review Board was cited by the Young Adult Library Services Association (YALSA) and the American Library Association for "Excellence in Library Service to Young Adults", one of the nation's outstanding programs. In addition, the Teen Services Department received the 2001 Excellence in Public Library Service Award given by the Connecticut State Library and the Connecticut Library Association. Blosveren has served on American

Library Association national committees including the 2001 Michael L. Printz Award which annually selects the outstanding young adult book in the nation and the 2006 Margaret Edwards Committee which nationally recognizes a young adult author for lifetime achievement. She served on the Young Adult Library Services Association Advocacy Task Force and the American Library Association Human Resources and Development Recruitment Advisory Committee. Blosveren was also an American Library Association trainer, providing professional development for public library staff interested in providing quality service to young adults on topics including collection development, programming and youth involvement. She has presented workshops on youth services at libraries and universities and at state, regional and national conferences. She has also written numerous articles which have appeared in state and national publications.

Blosveren was awarded the Distinguished Alumnus Award for Meritorious Contributions to Librarianship from the Southern Connecticut State University Department of Information and Library Science from which she received her Master's Degree. The Distinguished Alumnus Award is presented to a graduate of the program who has made outstanding contributions to the library/ information science profession. Blosveren is a member of the Connecticut Library Association, American Library Association, Young Adult Library Services Association, Stratford Community Organizations Council, Stratford Rotary Club, The Square One Theatre Company Advisory Board, the Fairfield Library Administrators Group and the Stratford School Readiness and Child Care Advisory Council.

"It's been an exciting time for the Stratford Library and I'm proud to have been its director", Blosveren said. "I'm also very pleased with the advances we've made including the availability of current technology resources, an extensive collection of materials in a variety of formats, programming for all ages, a continual collaboration with town agencies and a comprehensive outreach to the entire community of Stratford." There will be a public reception in Blosveren's honor on Wednesday, February 17 from 3:30-6:30 pm in the Stratford Library's Main Lobby.

there, combined with 119—or possibly more—apartment buildings lessening the traffic, or having no impact on traffic. It's just not believable. I don't think the idea is right for the town of Orange. I think the idea is sound; however I don't feel that this proposal is what we envisioned," he said.

Mitch Goldblatt, though not against a mixed use development, said his vision of that is a single story shopping center with a single story apartment above it. He, along with about a dozen others, spoke during the public hearing. "I was shocked to see a four- to five-story building here. This looks more like a city district than a town district. What you're looking at is way out of proportion for the area that we're talking about. To give us the impression that people are going to live here, work here and have less reliance on the automobile is preposterous. It's the toughest intersection around. It's not going to get better by adding all of this," Goldblatt said. Roeco originally presented its plan to the commission in December and was asked to conduct a traffic study and come back to the commission in January. Attorneys for the developer said the study showed that there would be little to no impact on traffic in the immediate area of the plaza.

Cathy Hatrick, a Racebrook Road resident, finds it very difficult during peak hours to get out of her driveway. "It's preposterous to tell me that this would not impact traffic. To think about looking out my back window and seeing a four story building is pretty troubling for me. I don't feel very good about it."

Peter Newman, speaking for the developer, said, "This site is the introduction to your town by people coming from many different destinations. Firelite plaza holds a special place in my memory—a time when shopping was done in a different fashion, there was no such thing as online shopping and the world was moving at a slower pace. There's a certain charm to that site. We think that what we're proposing is a way to revitalize and bring some of the charm back to the town." Members of the commission failed to see the charm that the developer envisioned and unanimously denied the request to change the regulation. "Looking at our current regulations, the first thing that is prohibited in that zone is dwellings, so we're really being asked to make a vast change. We'd be going from no dwellings in a zone to a high density use," said commissioner Oscar Parente.

### ASD FITNESS CENTER IS CHANGING LIVES, ONE AT A TIME **March 5 Fundraiser Planned to Support Scholarships**

The Bethany Leapley Autism Spectrum Disorder Scholarship Fund is hosting its 3rd annual Craft Beer and Wine Tasting on Saturday, March 5th at 7 p.m. The evening will feature a delicious selection of beer and wine, hors d'oeuvres and sweet treats, music and silent auction items including golf outings, Red Sox tickets, autographed Doug Flutie photo, spa treatments and more. This takes place at St. Barbara's Church at 480 Racebrook Road. All funds collected will be used to award scholarships to those in need to attend the ASD Fitness Center, which serves children and adults with Autism Spectrum Disorder, providing a safe, comfortable and structured environment for empowering individuals with ASD to improve their level of physical fitness.

Hamden resident Stephanie Bryant began bringing her son Maurice, 7, to the ASD Fitness Center last April and she says the change in her son is incredible. "He had such a problem with balance before—he couldn't walk down the stairs by himself. He would fall off of chairs if they didn't have arms to hold him," Bryant said. She joined a support group in West Haven and was introduced to the center when a guest speaker addressed the group. "I was looking for any help I could get," Bryant says. "The ASD Fitness Center made wonders happen."

10 minutes!" Bryant said. "While he's walking, he keeps his balance and walks with his head held high. He used to be so self-conscious, being in a regular elementary school, but he's not anymore." Maurice's training involves treadmills, balance beams and rock climbing walls.

The ASD Fitness Center offers oneon-one personal training with certified trainers, all whom have backgrounds in special education. The gym uses the Bal-A-Vis-X (an acronym for Balance -Auditory - Vision - eXercises) approach to exercise. These exercises are deeply rooted in rhythm and range from simple to complex. The majority of the exercises is done with sand-filled bags and/ or racquet balls and may incorporate the use of a balance board. The exercises can be adapted to work with children and adults of all abilities. The center also offers a variety small group classes such as Adaptive Karate, Hip-Hop, Yoga and Circuit Cardio.

"Even beyond the physical part of it, Maurice is comfortable and happy at the fitness center. It feels like a big family and he's really enjoyed meeting people of all ages there," Bryant says. "He loves the community events that they hold the Sensitive Santa, a group trip to a corn maze, they're decorating cookies for Valentine's Day."

She hopes that the fundraiser will mean more families can benefit from the fitness center's offerings. All funds collected will be utilized to award scholarships to children and adults for the ASD Fitness Center. Last year's event raised \$50,000 that was distributed as scholarships to families who otherwise could not have afforded to send their family member with autism to the center.

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## **Did You Know?** A New Year, New Numbers to Keep in Mind for 2016

#### Gift and Estate Tax:

- The federal lifetime exemption for property passing to nonspouse beneficiaries has been *increased* to \$5,450,000.00.
- The Connecticut lifetime exemption for property passing to nonspouse beneficiaries **remains the same at \$2,000,000.00**.
- There is still an unlimited gift/estate deduction for property passing to a spouse; however, in order to qualify for the unlimited gift/estate deduction the spouse must be a U.S. citizen.
- The amount that can be gifted to any one person without needing to file a gift tax return **remains the same at \$14,000.00** per recipient.
- Additional gifts can be made for qualified medical expenses and qualified education expenses without needing to file a gift tax return.

#### Long Term Care Provided in a Nursing Home:

- If one spouse is living at home ("Community Spouse") and the other spouse is living in a nursing home, the amount of non-excluded assets the Community Spouse can keep **remains the same at \$119,220.00.**
- If one spouse is living at home and the other spouse is living in a nursing home, the minimum amount of monthly income the Community Spouse can have has been *increased* to \$1,991.25, and the amount it can be increased to, without an administrative hearing remains the same at \$2,980.50.
- If one spouse is living at home and the other spouse is living in a nursing home, the amount of equity in the family home that can be excluded **remains the same at \$828,000.00**.

#### Long Term Care Provided in Your Home:

- The amount of monthly income you can have and still be eligible for the Connecticut Home Care Program for Elders (CHCPE) has been *increased* to \$2,199.00.
- Use of a pooled trust for excess income to establish eligibility or to avoid co-pays remains a viable option.

# BLADES HOCKEY: FOR THE LOVE OF THE SPORT

This winter 23 local families made a commitment to love and honor their daughters' passion. They spend countless hours bundled and shivering, waking at the crack of dawn, traveling many miles, watching their precious daughters play what has traditionally been a sport reserved for boys: ice hockey.

They play for the love of the sport and this year, for the love of winning. The Blades are 11-2-1 so far. The 23 girls are from Bethany, Orange, Woodbridge, Cheshire and North Haven, towns that often are the strongest of rivals.

Orange parent, Lisa MacNamara, says the girls put their rivalries aside for hockey season, work together and enjoy playing the game. "There is the coming together at the beginning of the season and getting the introductions out of the way. Then everyone gets to know one another while practicing. Amity and Cheshire are rivals but the girls have always worked great together. Of course when the girls meet during other sports such as lacrosse; the rivalry is back on!" she jokes.

"Girls hockey is growing," says Kara DelVecchio, of Orange, whose daughter Andrea plays for the Blades. "Most work well with others, it teaches her to become a good team-mate and respect authority such as her 4 coaches. These are qualities she can use her whole life. It is very time consuming and forces hard work and determination for success."

For the Kosh family of Bethany, it all started quite innocently. "I just wanted my girls to learn to ice skate as it was a favorite pastime of mine when I was a child. Grace would be getting off the ice after figure skating and see the boys coming on with sticks and pucks and wanted to know what they were doing? She said that looked like more fun—and our 'monster' was created!" Tricia Kosh says, adding, "I love the talent it takes, you have all the talent of most all other sports (speed, eye hand coordination, agility, passing, receiving etc.), but you are doing it all while skating!"

Kosh confers that the girls from three schools get along great and are quite used to playing with girls from across the state. "The girls can be playing one day for Blades and then be playing against each other on their league team. They always play hard against or with each but then come off the ice and take pics!"

Few sports are as fierce, yet sentimental as girls' hockey. The families, based on their daughters' love of the sport, make great sacrifices of time and money, but the payoff is well worth the investment. "We spend the money and travel crazy because our girls love it and the friendships they make are the best of any kind!" Kosh says. "Grace considers all these girls her best friends. provided important decision making in identifying and appointing a strong leadership team in the School of Pharmacy, which has resulted in consistent enrollment growth and "candidate status" with the Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education. In addition, he was instrumental in recently securing a large gift to support the University's new Daniel and Martina Lewis Center for Healthcare Innovation and Technology. Moreover, he was the driving force in developing the University's 2014-2019 strategic plan, working with President Drucker, the Board and faculty and staff across the University, including at the University's two international campuses in Canada and England.

Further, working closely with the vice provost for academic and international affairs, the associate provost for educational resources and assessment, the college deans and the Academic Policies and Research Committee of the Faculty Senate, Capuano has provided the leadership for much-needed changes to the University's nationally recognized University Core program, the adoption of the Individual Development and Educational Assessment (IDEA) system for both instructor and course assessment and development, and important changes to the requirements for completion of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science degrees, including the establishment of uniform general-education requirements across similar programs at the University which a University-wide faculty task force was recently charged by Capuano to study and make recommendations concerning.

In his former position as vice provost for international affairs, Capuano provided oversight of the University's Office of Global Partnerships and worked closely with the University's Office of Global Learning to facilitate study abroad and other international initiatives. Moreover, he was the driving force in developing the University's new campus in Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada, providing oversight of academic and non-academic responsibilities, including accreditation of the campus and all its programs, the hiring of faculty and staff, developing and monitoring the campus's budget, and ensuring that the campus met the objectives outlined in its strategic plan. In addition, he also served as Vancouver Campus provost for a year during a critical transition period.

As director of the School of Psychology for nearly 15 years and a former doctoral faculty member in the University's Ph.D. Program in Clinical Psychology and Psy.D. Program in School Psychology — the second of which he helped to develop — he provided important leadership in developing the school into one of the largest and more prestigious schools at the University. His many accomplishments in this position included establishment of the postdoctoral certificate program in clinical psychopharmacology and its transition to a postdoctoral Master of Science degree program. He was instrumental in developing the program's initial curriculum, including providing expert lectures in several courses — a program that has earned national recognition and is currently only one of just a few programs recognized by the American Psychological Association for postdoctoral training in clinical psychopharmacology.

As a former faculty member and biopsychologist by training, Capuano introduced and taught key compulsory courses in both doctoral programs in the School of Psychology — Biological Bases of Behavior and Psychopharmacology in the Ph.D. Program in Clinical Psychology and Child and Adolescent Psychopharmacology in the Psy.D. Program in School Psychology. His research included the design, implementation and supervision of experiments in neuropsychopharmacology and health psychology, from planning and evaluating new research to working on the development of compounds and behavioral interventions for clinical use. Moreover, he supervised numerous doctoral dissertations as well as master's theses and has published numerous abstracts and research articles with colleagues and former students in scholarly journals such as Developmental Brain Research; Pharmacology, Biochemistry and Behavior; Annals of Behavioral Medicine; and Obesity Research. He also is a research fellow with The Obesity Society (formerly the North American Association for the Study of Obesity).

Capuano earned his Ph.D. in biopsychology and two master's degrees from the Graduate and University Center of the City University of New York, as well as his B.S. in biological sciences from Purdue University.

# DO YOU HAVE A RELATIONSHIP WITH YOUR INVESTMENTS?

It goes without saying that most of us discuss the stock market as if it was a living, breathing thing that has feelings and emotions. It's funny when you think about it, not only do we think of the "market" as a living feeling thing, it is often discussed in terms of human emotion; "The market didn't like what was happening in China so it went down today" or "the market is not moving because it didn't like what the Federal Reserve Board is doing with interest rates". Whether you want to acknowledge it or not, as investors we do have somewhat of a relationship with our money and investing. For starters, most of us are really ticked off about the market and how it is behaving so far this year.

So, what kind of relationship do you have with the market and your investments?

Do you have a turbulent relationship? At the end of a 200 point downside, do you feel unsettled and confused? Turbulence would be best left at 40,000 feet; however, it happens to be one of the most common characteristics for those that invest in the market. Maybe the market is having a bumpy ride and you can't breathe until the volatility settles. Would you want a long term relationship with someone who exhibited turbulent behavior? If that doesn't bother you, then maybe it's okay to have the market in your life. On the other hand, if you are losing sleep and glued to CNBC, maybe it is time to re-evaluate your risk tolerance.

Maybe you have a love hate relationship with the market and your investments? You love them when they are doing well, confident and moving upward and you dislike it when they lose value. This kind of relationship is difficult, because you understand the potential long term rewards of being in it for the long-haul. It's like exercising, we know we should do it and it often comes with aches and pains in the beginning but over time, it makes a big difference in overall health. Some relationships are "good on paper". They have all the right criteria, but lack the spark needed to move forward. You receive your investment statements and look at the pie chart that shows your asset allocation. Most 401k statements actually show you how your investments compare to someone your age and give a projection of future income. However, when you look at your account values, they don't seem to be increasing enough and you wonder why? Seek advice from a financial advisor who can help you look at the big picture and make sure that the diversified pie chart

goes beyond a stock and bond allocation – maybe all of your stock investments are large cap, maybe they lack international.

Maybe you don't feel you have a relationship with the market and your investments, however, you feel like the market actually knows you. For example, "every time I invest the market goes down", or "I know I won't make money, I never do". This could be construed as a negative or pessimistic relationship; you already feel the loss before the first date! Investing is riddled with emotions. Accept this and, as with any conflicting situation, understand the parts that are out of your control (the market) and manage the things that you can control (your emotions).

Dalbar is a company that studies investor behavior and analyzes investor market returns. Its studies consistently show that the average investor earns below average returns. According to the Dalbar Study, for a twenty year period ending 12/31/2015 the S & P Index averaged 9.85% a year. For that same time period the average equity fund investor earned an average of just 5.19%. Why? The problem is human reaction, whether to good news or bad news, investors overreact. This emotion causes illogical investment decisions. This tendency to overreact can become even greater during times of personal uncertainty, near retirement or for example, when the economy is bad.

If we could only control our emotions when it comes to investing. Helping you to keep your emotions in check is one of the many responsibilities of your financial advisor. They should be there to talk you off of the bridge and make sure you stay on track for your future. This doesn't always mean staying the course, your advisor needs to understand your tolerance for risk, and unfortunately, when the markets become volatile so do our emotions.

# SOME GERMAN WINES FOR VALENTINES

It is time to take a little different approach to wine for Valentine's Day. A few years ago some nice sparkling wine may have filled the bill. Some Champagne or Prosecco would do nicely for a Valentine's Day dinner. After a few years those wines may not seem so special any more. So some German wines may be a nice change for our Valentine's Day dinner and produce a nice surprise for our Valentines. These wines include Spatlase. This is a Late Harvest wine made from fully ripened grapes that are late picked; even those with some sweetness. A spatlese may be dry or may have a touch of sweetness but are generally not too sweet due to the acid in the grapes.

Auslese literally selected harvest are made from very ripe grapes harvested in select bunches. These grapes can only be made in the best years that have been sufficiently warm. Beerenauslese is literally berry select harvest; are rare and costly wines. Generally auslesen can only be made in the best years that have seen sufficient warm, picking individual bunches means that the wines are expensive. Most auslesen are lush with some sweetness.

Beerenauslese is literally, berry selected harvest, beerenauslesen are rare and costly wines made from individual grapes that have been picked by hand and have been effected by noble rot. Trockenberrenauslese (TBA) means dry berry select harvest. TBA are the richest, sweetest, most rear and most expensive of all German wines. TBA is only produced in exceptional years and is made from grapes that have become raisins. This is referred to as botrytis. The grapes are gathered by hand and it takes a person a full day to pick enough grapes to ferment one bottle of wine. Due to the raisin quality of the grapes, it is quite difficult to ferment them into wine. So much so the wine is generally only 6 percent alcohol. The wine is very intense in flavor and very high in price.

The next category of German wine is Eiswein. Ice wine it is made from ripe frozen grapes. They pick the grapes at day break and the workers wear gloves so their hands don't warm the grapes. When the wine is pressed, the sweet, high-acid, concentrated juice is separated from the ice. The grapes must be naturally frozen on the vine. Austria and Canada are also famous for making eiswein in this way. In other parts of the world as well as Connecticut they put the grapes in a freezer!

German wines, as a group, are falsely thought to be sweet. In actuality, most fine German wines are dry and at least taste that way. After the second world war enormous quantities of inexpensive German wines were intentionally made sweet. This was done to appeal to GIs who were stationed there and to the Germans themselves, who, economically destitute and suffering from poor diets, craved sweetness since sugar had been rationed during the war. Since then the nature of German wines have come to be made dryer. They use the term Trocken or Halbtroken which means dry or half dry. Germany's greatest grape is Riesling. So for this Valentine's Day try some Halbtorken Qualitatswein bestimmter Riesling. You and your Valentine will be glad you did!

# Let's Do It Again...

Now this is only MY opinion but with technology, we have lost some of the finer elements of our society; communication without a cell phone, iPhone, iPad etc. When we travel today, we use our phones to document our trips, the scenery, the whales jumping in the air and other wonderful sites and when we get home, we gather around the dinner table to view the slide show taken by the travelers. I saw a group of teachers, huddled around an iPad the other day enjoying whatever was being shared. Believe me, there is no reason to despair about this but there was a time when events would be shared by mail to include the homebound member in the travels and joys of an adventure.

So, what AM I talking about? Postcards. Yes, those wonderful little pictures of far-away places that made going to the mailbox a true adventure to light up the faces of the recipients to see and read about places far away. There are postcard clubs throughout the United States collecting these wonders of the many companies that published cards of every description from local hometown scenes to cartoons, art collections...you name it there is a postcard out there to suit everyone.

Take the very famous Hummel figurines for example. Three publishers are credited with postcards of her work, with some of the cards being worth many times more than the postage needed to send it. A great deal of history can be learned from reading old postcards and in some instances getting a good laugh out of the way things were said and what was said. A postcard from Will Rogers says "am

I happy! Well, I should say yes - too happy for words, hence via this postcard I can tell you that I didn't get in on the fighting - but I was sure there when it came to yelling!" This card was sent the day after the World War I armistice, November 12, 1918. The historical society owns a post card sent from the Orange country fair around the 1920s where the writer is telling someone of his day and that Orange is "a queer little town".

any sent from another location would surely have been received in the United States at some point.

With communication so rare before WWI, postcards were the face of the nation and the world being kept in shoeboxes along with the letters sent from loved ones. It was a lasting view, not subject to erasing

or deleting. Postcards are valuable, mostly to historians who can document events by the pictures and the messages written on the back or, in some cases, on the front.

The amount of people who remember Savin Rock is dwindling, but the mass of



postcards available shows the many aspects that trigger the memories of those who rode the Thunderbolt. Who remembers eating at Wilcox's Pier Restaurant or walking on the boardwalk? Unless the visitor was armed

with a camera and several rolls of film, most of Savin Rock's visual history can be found in the many post cards produced at that time. When we talk about postcards, we see a small 4x6 card with a picture on one side and writing on the other, but can you imagine a postcard made out of wood, stamped and delivered through the postal system? Or how about a card made out of a piece of leather, passing through the mail? The historical society has both. Any number of oddities came out after WWII including a card from Salt Lake, Utah with a

little bag of salt attached to the card. If that isn't odd enough, postcards from the St Helen's eruption carry packets of ash.

The Christmas theme is a wide selection of cards, some of which carry a hefty sale price if in pristine condition. Raphael Tuck and Ellen Clapsaddle are well known to postcard collectors



date, in large letters across the card. We talk about the penny postcard; well

there were machines, dispensing cards at a penny apiece with one of its more rare cards being Lillian Russell.

The first postcard appeared around 1874 with their novelty provoking some fault finding being made fun of as stingy and unsafe. They were cheap and people used them but they had two enemies; the man who received a dun\* and the manufacturer of writing paper causing a decrease from 15 million to 12 million dollars in sales. The first cards were made in Holyoke, Mass. with 40 men employed for their manufacture and one million cards being turned out per day. Our very own Elbert Scobie had cards printed of Orange in 1909 using a German printing company. Although there are many towns in Connecticut with many more scenes, the Scobie cards are quite collectible outside of Orange as their themes span a variety of themes. Take the card entitled "Starting For The Orange Fair, Orange, Conn." for example; a highly sought after card because of its country fair connection, train and train station depiction and an early 1909 card of Orange. The numbers are low but they are "ours" and depict parts of town previously



unknown

to 20th century collectors. The historical society owns several cards depicting Orange Center Road when it was South Main Street and North Main Street. Although this information can be found with research, the little old shoebox of postcards has given collectors more information in less time than arduous research. I bet you don't know where lover's lane was or, for that matter, still is. Maybe the illustration will help you.

In attending several postcard club events, our staff has become aware of the many types of cards being collected and especially certain towns within known towns such as Soundview, CT

which is in Old Lyme, Mashapaug in Union and, of course, Devon in Milford. There was a time when postcards were sent to the E.B. Clark Seed Company with a Milford address and delivered to Orange. These postcards are especially interesting as it gives a brief history of the comings and goings of this Orange/Milford company. A collection of cards for the B.B. Hill Bell Co. in East Hampton made for an interesting read with the variety of bells that were ordered from around the state and the country. These were the traditional penny postcard with the 1 cent stamp reproduced on the front for the address and the company sending the order imprinted on the back with the order or in some cases complaint, handwritten.

Lighthouses are a big collection as well, ships, automobiles, children, and

Can you imagine today's price of a postcard sent from England just before boarding the Titanic? Obviously any postcards onboard are long gone but



the ever popular antique airplanes. The Tin Goose, a Ford Tri-motor was built between 1926 & 1933 and postcards exist for the production models of the Goose. A recently sold postcard of New Haven Airport would, at first glance not be of great value except for the fact that it had a 1943 Eastern Airlines flight plan, written by the pilot on the back. There he wrote the ground and air speed, their destination which was Miami and a stopover at West Palm Beach. This card is now in the possession of the pilot/manager of Tweed New Haven Airport.

# AFFECTION AND YOUR DOG

February 14th is a special day to express love for those we care about. Humans use touch to communicate greetings, connection and affection via a handshake, hug or kiss. Dogs use gestures to communicate affection, too they nuzzle, nudge, rub up against and even groom each other. Using human gestures on our canine companions, however, can be unsettling to them. So here are the facts about what we consider as being "physical," and offer some better choices on how we can show our affection to our much-loved pets.

**Respect your dog's space.** Dogs don't hug like we do; instead, they snuggle or nuzzle. To a dog, hugging is typically construed as a dominant or assertive gesture similar to "mounting" or "humping." Thus, if you want to give your dog a hug, remember that he may regard the gesture as overbearing. Respect his space, and go slowly over time to help him get used to your closeness.

**Gentle strokes are best.** To a dog, stroking is similar to nuzzling. When your dog puts his paw on another dog's neck, back or head, he is not "petting" the dog—he is expressing his assertiveness over him. For a human to pet a dog, however, is a perfectly acceptable form of affection, particularly when delivered as a loving stroke and accompanied by soft praise. The gesture can reaffirm that we are pleased with the dog and is also relaxing and calming to him.

The least threatening type of pet we can give a dog is stroking him under his chin. However, an overly physical "pet"—the kind given by some young children—can be intimidating, particularly if the child is a "petting hammer." Some dogs are hypersensitive to touch due to chronic illness like arthritis or environmental annoyances like flea and fly bites. If your dog has an unknown past, even the softest touch may startle him, so keep your movements slow, calm and deliberate. Gently stroke his shoulders and keep contact with his body while you give affection. Resist picking up your small dog. Pups are picked up (by their mothers) only when they are very young. While most of us cannot physically pick up a Great Dane, we don't hesitate to swoop down and lift tiny dogs like Chihuahuas or Maltese. We forget that no matter how small, a dog is still a dog and, as such, is usually uncomfortable being picked up. This is simply not natural to a dog and puts him in a position where he may feel trapped.

Being lifted up also elevates the dog to a higher position physically, thereby giving him a false impression that he is higher in stature than the person. When this happens, the person picking him up may be inadvertently supporting the dog's aggressive tendencies.

Although unlikely, lifting up your dog can cause injury. A fall from your arms could break bones, harm the spine or worse. Dogs such as dachshunds, basset hounds and corgis are prone to back problems due to their long backs and short legs. Allowing them to jump up for attention or picking them up can actually cause strain on their vertebrae, leading to chronic pain or slipped discs.

**Dogs learn by association.** If a dog has ever been hit, pinned down, rolled over, kicked or over-handled in the past, we must rebuild his trust slowly and gently. This may mean little or no physical touch until he shows through his body language that he is ready for such attention.

Avoid pulling on your dog's collar. Grabbing your dog's collar to deal with issues like jumping up or rushing out the door can be viewed as very threatening; dogs just don't do this to each other. And you may have noticed that, the more you pull back on your dog's leash or collar, the more he pulls forward. This tendency to pull is a natural, built-in reaction-think of sled dogs and how they pull a sled. Every time we pull excessively on our dog's leash or collar, we risk causing damage to his neck and back. Constant tension or grabbing and yanking a dog by the collar can cause real harm by damaging the cervical vertebrae (neck bones), nerves in the neck and trachea (windpipe). It doesn't really matter how much affection you give to your dog this Valentine's Day as long as you both have fun. Whether you opt for simple or extravagant, make it a safe and enjoyable holiday for both you and your furry best friend.
