### Candidates Being Chosen for November Elections

#### ZEOLI, MOYHER RUNNING FOR THE TOP SEAT

Orange Democratic Town Committee chairman Polly Demirjian opened this year's election season by revealing her nominating committee's choice for first selectman: Mark Moyher. Moyher will challenge long-time First Selectman Jim Zeoli who confirmed that if approved by his Republican caucus in July, he would seek a tenth term in office.

After all these years in office, Zeoli has a lot of accomplishments to point to. "I run on my record of economic development, repeated mill rate reductions, and preserving the character of the community by purchasing open space," he wrote in an email. He also pointed out that he is supportive of the school system, and has partnered with volunteers in the community to develop a new playground at Fred Wolfe Park.

Mark Moyher works in the financial industry, as head of trading at Wright's Investors Service, and has lived in Orange for a quarter century. He currently serves on the town's Recycling Committee. Two years ago, he ran for the position of tax collector, in an election where the Republican ticket swept town hall, and Moyher lost.

"Orange is not the same as it was 25 years ago," he said in his acceptance speech, adding, "It can be more." By "more" he means more economic development, more services for seniors and young families, more opportunities to gather and socialize. The theme of "More" is also reflected in his campaign slogan, "MorewithMoyher," which is

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### **Orange Family Leading Mission** Team on Trip to Jamaica GROUP TO HELP INDIVIDUALS WITH

### DISABILITIES WHO HAVE BEEN ABANDONED

Many people and families from Connecticut enjoy vacations in Jamaica, visiting the beautiful beaches in well-known resort areas like Ocho Rios, Negril, and Montego Bay. For one family from Orange and a group of their friends, an upcoming trip to this Caribbean Island will have a different focus.

Stephanie and Sam Larson, along with their two children, Julian and Jessica, will be leading a mission trip team to volunteer at Mustard Seed Communities (MSC) in the Jamaican capital of Kingston. The mission team will spend time with the MSC residents - many of which are children - who have a range of disabilities. Their goal is to serve them through love and companionship. They will also complete various work projects to improve the infrastructure and facilities where the residents live, learn, and play. The mission team also includes residents of Milford and New Haven, as well as others from Massachusetts, Pennsylvania and Georgia.

Stephanie and Sam both know MSC well; they have been on multiple mission trips with the organization in the past. Now that Julian and Jessie have both reached age 15 (the minimum age for volunteers travelling to MSC), the entire family is excited to be a part of this adventure in service to others. "Most of the kids at MSC have very little materially, but they are some of the most beautiful and spirit filled individuals you will ever meet," says

Stephanie. MSC is dedicated to caring for the most vulnerable populations in society and began in 1978 as a home for children with disabilities on the outskirts of Kingston. Since then, the organization has also expanded to Nicaragua, Dominican Republic, Zimbabwe, and Malawi.

In preparation for their trip, the mission team has been busy fundraising and collecting needed supplies and other physical donations to take with them to Jamaica. "MSC does a great job managing their resources and is always working towards being as self-sufficient as possible, but caring for hundreds of residents including many with special needs is challenging,' Sam explained. "We want every resident at MSC to be able to develop to their full potential, and are committed to helping achieve that."

According to Stephanie, another significant benefit of the mission trip is the long-term affect it has on those that participate. "We see people who go on an MSC mission trip come home with a new perspective on volunteering; many find new ways to get involved in their own community with helping others. It's kind of addicting, but in a good way!"

#### TOWN OF ORANGE | LEGAL NOTICE TAX COLLECTOR

Per CGS 12-145, the first installment of the town tax on the 2022 Grand List of 1 October 2022 is due and payable on 1 July 2023. Payments received after 1 August 2023 are considered delinquent and are subject to the rate of 18% per annum, 1.5% per month, \$2.00 minimum CGS 12-146, dating back to the original due date. Motor Vehicle bills are payable in one installment. Real Estate and Personal Property taxes are payable in two installments with  $\frac{1}{2}$  due on 1 July 2023 and the second installment on 1 Jan 2024. All taxes may be paid in one installment. We DO NOT rebill for second installments. Your tax bill has a January tax bill attached. As owners of property, taxpayers are responsible to see that taxes are paid when due. FAILURE TO RECEIVE A TAX BILL DOES NOT EXEMPT YOU FROM PAYMENT OF ALL INTEREST CHARGES AND COLLECTION COSTS, per Connecticut General Statutes 12-130, 12-148. Payments may be processed in person at the Town Tax window in Town Hall, 617 Orange Center Rd, Orange, CT, Monday-Friday except holidays from 8:30 a.m. -12 noon and 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Bring your entire three-part tax bill if you wish a receipt. A payment coupon or duplicate bill must accompany each payment. There is a \$2.00 fee charged for each duplicate bill requested. Payments may also be made by mail. The receipt date will be that of the USPS date on the envelope. Only USPS stamped dates are considered valid. If a receipt is desired a self-addressed stamped envelope and your three-part bill must be included with your payment. We do not accept CASH payments through the mail! E-checks, Credit and Visa Debit Card payments are only accepted on-line (convenience fees apply). See the Town of Orange website.

### First Selectman's Update on Fred Wolf Park

I am writing to give an update on Fred Wolfe Park since I have heard a lot of misinformation being distributed by a few people.

The Town of Orange has needed a new community playground since the closing of the Mary L. Tracy playground during school hours. This has been a wish of mine and brought to me as a need by many parents and families. I began an evaluation of possible locations since the schools were all off limits during school hours and High Plains Community Center cannot be used during camp sessions and the many events that are held during the year. The open space areas were considered, but many hold development restrictions.

Fred Wolfe Park seemed like a perfect fit for a community family friendly playground. The property was measured out and the idea was brought to the Board of Selectmen to clear the property at the October 2, 2019 meeting, it was approved unanimously to clear 8+ acres for a barrier free playground, access road and future use at Fred Wolfe Park. In February of 2020 the Playground Committee was formed to start choosing the layout and equipment. This was going to be an extensive project and I agreed to handle the site work and prep for a beautiful new family friendly playground as approved by the Board of Selectmen, not just Jim Zeoli. The entire Board of Selectmen have voted and

approved on each phase to develop this playground.

This property is owned by the 14,000 people who call Orange home. Fred Wolfe Park is not a single use property, it is just over 67 acres of both usable and unusable areas. The first area that was developed was for soccer, then lacrosse fields were added. These two programs are excellent for children and the playground is also for the children. Profound consideration has been given to this playground and safety measures planned to make sure it is done correctly including a separate parking area, sidewalk, and fencing. The original entry will be improved this year, and the second entrance is in development. The central hub of Fred Wolfe Park will continue to be Hollow and Oakview Roads, this made the best sense then and with limited access points to this property it continues to make sense today.

At the request of residents, The Fred Wolfe Park Ad Hoc Committee was appointed in December 2022. There has been a petition circulating under the name of the Orange Soccer Association that was started before this committee met for the first time. I have had residents tell me how they have been accosted by Mr. Pisano at the soccer field while trying to watch their children and grandchildren play their soccer game and that they must sign this petition. They have made claims that the Town chooses corn over kids, and you need to sign because that is how a state-of-the-art facility

will be built. The Orange Soccer Association and Mr. Tom Pisano have personally exposed themselves to a defamation of character lawsuit from the Hine Family of Field View Farm and the Bespuda Family. These families have done nothing wrong by leasing farmland from the Town, yet Mr. Pisano continues to defame these families. The Hine's Lease does not hold up any development of that portion of Fred Wolfe Park as there are no present plans or funding sources currently for that area. In April of 2021 it was unanimously approved by the Board of Selectmen to grade and seed the area directly across from the current soccer fields for new practice fields, this area is fully fenced and includes underground sprinklers for the fields. This area could easily accommodate the young children who play at Mary L. Tracy, but Mr. Pisano refuses to use this area and continues to call this area a dog park. Each morning as I have watched the playground construction, residents do bring their dogs in but not to run in the fenced in area but on the soccer fields.

The Ad Hoc committee is reviewing the current layout of the park and is in the middle of reviewing traffic and safety study proposals that were submitted. There are no plans until this committee completes their evaluation task. There have been many expansion ideas proposed to the committee including bathrooms, basketball courts, and pickleball courts to name a few. The committee meetings are open to the public and they have encouraged residents to submit their ideas. The Ad Hoc committee has also been working in conjunction with the Park and Recreation Commission regarding current uses by groups that use the park. The Orange Soccer Association, Amity Girls Youth Lacrosse, and Amity Youth Lacrosse were each invited to both committee meetings to give updates about the number of children participating in their programs and share their wants and needs. The Park and Rec Commission has also asked for insurance certificates and copies of their financial tax returns, which they should be providing yearly. The Park and Recreation Commission would like to get the organizations using Town fields to contribute "in-like-kind". The Town mows all the fields, provides irrigation to the fields, and lines the fields, as well as emptying trash and recycling. Expansion is a great thing, but it does come with costs. The last filing seen for the Orange Soccer Association shows net assets or fund balances at the end of year to be \$200,000. I ask why does a not for profit 501(c) carry such balances? Why is this money not spent on the children in the program?

I have received many calls asking when the playground will be open. The playground construction is almost complete, the safety pads will be added soon. There will not be a grand opening until the sidewalk and fencing are complete. I believe the playground grand opening will be in June and I look forward to seeing you all there!

### They All Have a Story...

As we bounce around from one part of our lives to another, we may or may not visit with family members, especially if they live many miles away. A small staff of the Orange Historical Society has made it their mission to find those members of the town who helped make it a town, but are only known to the public by their names on their headstones.

As they clean the stones, with the utmost care and protocol, each one can be identified and in one case became a mystery. Yes, a mystery. As they follow the rows, it becomes obvious that members of one family were in some cases, buried together but in the middle of the Merwin family members sits Mehitable Woodruff's stone...why is she there? Using various resources at hand, the answer eluded us. Hmm. Where to go next. Since one source mentioned a will, the library at the State of CT gave us the answer.

Mehitable passed from consumption which in today's parlance is Tuberculosis. She was only 40 and from the documents provided by the library we read, "In consideration of the kindness shown to me by Mary T. Merwin and her husband Alpheus N. Merwin, I do hereby give devise and bequeath all my estate of every kind and nature which I may have to Mary T. Merwin to be hers absolutely and forever. She is to pay for a suitable grave stone & funeral expenses."

Indeed, Mehitable's stone is somewhat more elaborate than some, at a cost, in 1878 of \$32.00, approximately \$973 today. Opening her grave was \$5.00 which would cost \$152.00. We have



items that were related to the bathroom of today. She had 2 beds and 5 quilts, cotton sheets, linen sheets and 1 woolen sheet. Her house had a carpet at some point and she could boast 5 table cloths, tin ware and crockery.

In viewing this inventory, a question arises as to what she might have

> done as a profession or job as she had a savings account of \$90 in 1875 and I came up with the possibility of her being a teacher as it lists books and pictures...now granted, owning books

For these two stones, a mystery evolves in the spelling of Clark on Lucy's stone...it has an "e" at the end...hmm. Could

it be that the "e" made it appear to be of royalty or of someone important? At one point in our recent history, a truck ran into the front of the cemetery, damaging some of the monuments. It appears that Leverett Clark, whose name is always spelled with an "L" lost its "L" on Lucy's stone when the stone was replaced, so Lucy's husband lost an "L" but gained an "e". Her father and brother all spelled their names with the "L". There is a little stone, yet to be cleaned but known to the staff, of William Casner who was born ca 1844 and died in 1927. If you are good at math and history, you might wonder if William was in the Civil War...well, you would be right. He was in Company E 17th Massachusetts Volunteer Infan-

try serving in North Carolina. ### BU Expands Woodbridge Novelist's Literary Collection

Boston University began collecting Woodbridge author Russ Madison's books and manuscripts over the past four decades. The Mugar Memorial Library's Special Collections Division, devoted to archival preservation of literary works by global writers and artists, was attracted to Madison upon the publication of his first novel, "Victory Among the Insane," from Grove Press. The book received national critical acclaim and proceeded to outsell all previous Grove first novels.

Over the years Madison has produced a number of novels and poetry.
