# Amity "Twins" Ready for Official Guinness Record Book Listing

ORANGE - A bit of last minute paperwork is all that stands between the Amity High School Class of 2012 and a Guinness World Records title for "Most Twins in the Same Academic Year at One School." Triplet and Amity High senior Katherine Holden, who is organizing the effort to take the title, said from the time she set foot in Mary L. Tracy School she realized there are an unusually large number of multiples in her class. "When I was in kindergarten there were six sets of multiples in the school and at Turkey Hill there were four sets," she said. When she got to the high school and realized how many sibling sets there were she realized, "it must be a record of some sort." When she checked out the Guinness World Records' website she realized that Amity's multiple roster may, in fact, set a new record. "The book listed



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


*la* ham Dale recreated a popular Picasso

print for his annual holiday greeting card, substituting his own drawing of a snowman in place of Picasso's painting of a man. "I received so many nice comments from family and friends that I realized the concept could go further," he said.

So over the past year, he's designed nearly 100 greeting cards – recreating the recognizable artwork of famous artists like Matisse, Degas and Escher, and substituting his "Artistic Snowman" in place of the original subjects and developing his own "sporting snowman" series. In the sport series, the cuddly-looking snowman is featured conquering sports activities from skiing and ice skating to surfing and golfing. Through a series of contacts in the art world, Dale

landed an agent and a contract to work with a Toronto-based card production company to develop and distribute the greeting cards in 2013.

A native of Nottingham, England, Dale moved to town five years ago after meet-Orange ing resident Jolene Kane when she was travelling around England. "She was standing on a corner in Bronte country and I happened to be outdoors sketching and she wanted her photo taken!" he said. He took the photo and later took her to tea and the rest, as he says, is history. The two have since married and make their home on Lambert Road where their woodsy property and Dale's outdoor studio provide plenty of inspiration for his art. "It is just fantastic," Dale said as he sat at his painting table, surrounded by the unusual rocks, fossils, pinecones and canister of assorted turkey feathers that line the studio shelves. "The natural light is wonderful and the nature outside my window here is constantly changing," he said. The seasons give him plenty of fodder for his landscapes where he uses different mediums like oils and colored pencils. He usually spends hours each day working either in the outdoor studios or in the indoor loft.



drawing instructor at the Orange Senior Center and teaches private students as well. "Teaching is infectious -and it makes you think about what you're doing as well. I like teaching the early ages, you get to the children young and see them using the concepts. It's a joy," Dale said. "Seniors are even better. They bring their experience, character and interests to the class. They are so enthusiastic, it is amazing how many people have ability but never had the chance to do it." Dale currently has an exhibit running at the Davis Gallery, 200 Boston Post Road through January 9th showcasing his many landscapes and a portfolio of his card collection. "I've been lucky to maintain a balance between my own work and teaching. I so enjoy my work every day, the years have just flown by," Dale said.

At 67, Dale still hasn't created his favorite piece of art. "I finish one and I'm on to the next. An artist always wants to do a perfect painting and you always think, 'the next one is going to be it!' You always think you can improve," he said.

Dale knew early on that he wanted to be an artist even though as a young boy he was already working in the pubs his parents owned in London. At 13 he went to art school and later attended St. Martin's Art College in London. "It was a lively time, the time of the British invasion, where the Stones might be playing in a room above the pub and The Who were playing around the corner," he said. There was a creative relationship between the local art scene and the rock and roll music movement that was fun and exciting. "It was a great time to be young," Dale said, remembering playing darts with Jimi Hendrix and meeting Rod Stewart with a friend. He found work right away, painting

> large murals on the walls of local pubs and selling his art in exhibits. "But I was a realist, I knew it would be difficult to earn a living as an artist," he said. So Dale began teaching art classes in London to students ages 11 -18; which he continued throughout his life. Todav he is a painting and

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





# **Old Houses of Orange**

In 1934, a small group of people began visiting every town in Connecticut to survey its "old buildings." A Work Projects Administration (WPA) project, the staff of the Census of Old Buildings in Connecticut completed forms with information about the buildings and often also took photographs of the buildings. The majority are houses, but some schools, churches, factories, and libraries are included. The survey forms and photographs were deposited in the State Archives, with additions coming in as late as 1942.

The Connecticut State Library has transcribed the forms, digitized the photographs, and is pleased to present them online as part of the CSL Digital Collections. Please see WPA Architectural Survey Census of Old Buildings at: http://cslib.cdmhost.com/custom/frontpage\_wpa\_arch\_surv.php. To date, this information is online for Andover through Oxford. This is a work in progress and the information for other towns is being added as time allows.

Most of the buildings have no name and locations are rarely addresses, for example, "East side, facing west on Conn. 93, at southeast corner of Green." Construction dates and the original owners are as written on the survey forms even though more recent research may provide different information.

We encourage viewers to use the "Tell Us More" field in each building's descriptive metadata (information about an item) to email us with more information about each building, its history, its address, current status, etc. Any questions about this project can be directed to Carol Ganz, Reference Librarian, Connecticut State Library, carol.ganz@ct.gov, 860-757-6587.

have been slowly building their Christmas lawn display ever since. This year a flying Santa and his reindeer, Santa in a hot air balloon, Disney characters, assorted snowmen, a Nativity scene and thousands of dollars' worth of blinking, twinkling lights are the highlights of the outdoor trimmings. Now among the top most decorated homes in town, the couple who loves Christmas has added an extra attraction that sets them apart from the others. This year they've added a 45-minute synchronized music and lights show which has Christmas lights blinking to the rhythm of holiday music streaming from car radios and outdoor speakers.

Inspired by a TLC television program about the biggest light shows in the U.S. and several YouTube videos, the Smalls started planning for this year's festivities last year, hitting the after-Christmas sales and stocking up on lights. "We went crazy and bought a ton of lights!" Maria said. Then using a computer program, tech-savvy Chris compiled a collection of contemporary and traditional Christmas songs ranging from Elvis Presley's "Blue Christmas," and Dean Martin's "Marshmallow World" to Lady Gaga's "Christmas Tree," that can be accessed by tuning your car radio to 98.1 FM. Chris started building arches and preparing the lawn in September and the couple unveiled the show to neighbors after Thanksgiving. "It came out even better than we expected!" she said. And the Smalls have even more holiday spirit than usual – it is their six-month-old son Cooper's first Christmas!

Word of the holiday extravaganza has been slowly spreading. "We're hearing from friends that people are mentioning it at the gym and at the dump!" Lisa said. "We're starting to draw a lot of traffic."

The Smalls made sure to check with neighbors before they proceeded with their plan. "They were all awesome! Everyone was actually pretty excited about it, and they've been really supportive," she said. In fact one neighbor has an outdoor fire pit and the entire neighborhood has been hanging outside at night watching the show and the parade of cars. "One car stopped and a carful of kids got out and started dancing!" Lisa said. "We've seen people stay for at least half an hour and others that have stayed to watch a couple of shows."

Pomperaug High School in Southbury as holding the record with 13 sets of twins," she said. "I knew we had 14 sets of twins as well as my family of triplets."

So she followed the protocol on the website which outlined how to apply for a world record title. In the past few weeks Holden has compiled nearly all the necessary paperwork, including official class roster and student identifications and organized the required twin "event." Holden planned a photo day at the high school, bringing together all the multiples for a photo that will be featured in the class yearbook. It was the first time all the multiples had been together at the same event. She also invited local media and was thrilled when it was attended by WTNH-8 and Orange First Selectman James Zeoli. "I'm just waiting for IDs from four students and then I'll mail it all to London," she said. The word among the Amity multiples is that the prospect of being listed in the Guinness World Records Book is "really cool."

Aspen Lane twin Jenny Heyman said she was so excited when Holden contacted her about breaking the Guinness record. "How many people can say that they broke a world record??" she exclaimed. "It really hit me when we all got together for the group photo – I realized we are about to break a world record!"

Like Holden, Woodbridge resident Sarah Teitelman always noticed there were "lots of twins around" at school, but never paid particular attention to it. "I've been reading the Guinness World Records Book since I was a child so I am so excited and honored to actually have my name listed in it!," Teitelman said. "It was really fun and amazing to see all the twins together in one room for the first time. I feel really proud of the twins in my grade and especially of my school for breaking this record!"

Assistant Principal Bob Cole said he was taken by surprise when Holden submitted a facilities request informing him that the media would be coming to the school to cover the event. "Katherine handled this all on her own. School administrators did not know what was going on -- but we immediately made ourselves available," Cole said. "It was all good and it worked out well. We love to do things that reflect the many positive things that go on at Amity." Cole said he was aware there were many multiples in the high school but did not realize it might be record-breaking.

For Holden, the project is just one of many special things that come from being a multiple. She and her sister Rachel and brother Eric run in the same social circle and participate in many of the same activities, including the high school swim teams. "I think it's cool to be a triplet but I don't know any different," she said.

The most multiple birth sets in the same academic year at one school is 17, and consists of 14 sets of twins and 3 sets of triplets, achieved by Maine Township High School South in Park Ridge, Illinois.

# Orange 5 Year-Old Donates Hair for a Cause

When a mother, father, brother, aunt and cousin all showed up to see fiveyear-old Molly Stratford have the second haircut of her life, the customers at Milford's Hair Forever Salon speculated it was no ordinary haircut. And indeed it wasn't. The entourage was there to cheer on the pint-sized patron who was cutting off more than 8 inches of her shiny curls to donate to "Beautiful Lengths." Beautiful Lengths is a partnership between Pantene and the American Cancer Society which provides real-hair wigs free of charge to women with cancer who cannot afford to buy them.

Molly said she was "excited" to be part of helping give hair to those who lost theirs while battling cancer, particularly since her own family is all too familiar with the disease. In the past year, Molly's mom Michelle underwent chemotherapy and radiation treatment for breast cancer, her maternal grandmother, Lila Fink, died of lung cancer; and her paternal grandmother, Betty Stratford was recently diagnosed with cancer. Molly follows in the footsteps of her cousin, Jenna, who donated her own hair to Locks of Love several vears ago.

"I'm glad Molly wants to help others but I'm sad to see her cut her beautiful hair," she said.

Molly was in good hands as Michelle's own hairdresser for nearly 30 years, Mary Ellen Powers, sectioned off Molly's hair with rubber bands. While Michelle got a bit teary-eyed as Mary Ellen made the first cut, Molly was calm and nonchalant.

Michelle completed her cancer treatment in October and the Stratford family is anxious to put the past year behind them and are hopeful that a brighter future lies ahead. "I want to keep with me the good things that happened throughout my illness -- like the outpouring of goodness and kindness from family and friends," Michelle said. "There were days that I was too sick to even watch television and the doorbell would ring and there would be someone with dinner for the family. My family really stepped up to the plate -- I just have remarkable memories of everyone's support; I don't even remember how sick I was."

Just an hour later, Molly emerged from the salon with a chin length cut that showed off her big green eyes and headed off to a friend's birthday party, happy with her new look and happy that her hair will make a sick person feel a little bit better.

State Representative Paul Davis (D-Orange/Milford/West Haven) has been appointed Chairman of the Regulations Review Committee of the Gen-

eral Assembly by House Speaker Christopher Donovan (D-Meriden). The appointment is effective immediately. In announcing Rep. Davis's appointment, House Speaker Donovan said, "I am confident that your efforts will produce significant contributions to the legislative process.




The committee has oversight over regulations written by state agencies to ensure that the regulations written by those agencies are consistent with state law. The chairmanship of the committee is shared by both parties. "I am honored that Speaker Donovan has appointed me Chair of the Regulations Review Committee," Rep. Davis said.

"The committee serves an important role in the legislative process to carry out the intent of authorizing legislation passed by the General Assembly."

Rep. Davis, a committee member for seven years, replaces Timothy O'Brien, who has resigned from the legislature following his election as New Britain's mayor.

# Redistricting Changes Orange District Map

Orange's political boundaries underwent some changes after the bipartisan "Reapportionment Commission" has drawn up new state Senate and House district lines. The Reapportionment Commission will cause a change in the political districts within the town of Orange commencing with the 2012 General Assembly elections which will increase the number of house districts within Orange from two (114 & 117) to three (114, 117 & 119). The 117th House District, currently represented by Paul Davis, formerly covered approximately half of Orange, in addition to parts of Milford & West Haven. The new area is much smaller and limited to the western section of town. (See map below.) The 119th District, which previously was entirely in Milford, now includes the south eastern part of Orange. This district is currently represented by Richard Roy (D) who will not be seeking re-election as the redistricting has caused his residence to now be located in the 117th district represented by Paul Davis (D). This would be an open seat in 2012 and cause the need for Orange to make plans for a possible third polling location within the town.

# A Very, Very Carbon-Neutral Christmas

The great Christmas-tree debate should be settled for now. No more agonizing over artificial versus natural, not after the sustainable-development firm ellipsos released a bombshell study.

A life-cycle assessment -- following "the recognized ISO 14040 and 14044 standards" and relying on "no funding (direct or indirect) by any of the concerned stakeholders" -- determined that "a natural tree will generate 3.1 kg of greenhouse gases whereas the artificial tree will produce 8.1 kg per year."

The president of the firm rightly called the finding "astonishing," given that "the artificial tree is reusable" and "the natural tree requires annual trips to purchase it."

The artificial tree incurs such a carbon footprint at its inception -- with its manufacturing and then its transport from China -- that it takes 20 years of use for it to match a natural tree. Since most people don't find a raggedy fake tree entirely in keeping with the spirit of the season and throw out their artificial trees on average after a mere six years of use, the natural tree is clearly superior.

It sequesters carbon as it grows, and "watering the tree in the use stage only has marginal impacts." St. Boniface, who cut down the tree of Thor as a slap to the Norse gods and first suggested the fir as a symbol of Christianity, would no doubt be greatly relieved.

Following all this closely will be the new Christmas scolds, who are as annoying as the old Christmas scolds except greener. H.L. Mencken famously put down the Puritans -- decidedly cool on Christmas celebrations -- as people worried that someone, somewhere may be happy. The new Christmas scolds worry that someone, somewhere may be emitting CO2 over a glass of eggnog: Blessed is good, merry is nice, peaceful is advisable -- but carbon-neutral is absolutely essential.

Keep that in mind as you wrap your gifts -- if you must. According to the Clean Air Council, "An additional 5 tons of waste is generated during the holidays. Four million tons of this is wrapping paper and shopping bags." To avoid this carnage, kids either should be kept from ripping the wrapping paper so it can be reused -- good luck -- or the gifts should be placed in cloth gift sacks (ashes not included).

Did I mention kids? Aren't they the root of much of the wanton Christmas waste? No sooner are they out of their diapers (using 8,000 to 10,000 of them prior to potty training) than they are thrilling to Christmas lights (an estimated 200 pounds of unnecessary carbon emissions per season).

Ralph Reiland of the Pittsburgh Tribune-Review points to a Web publication called Alternative Consumer that recommends "A Freegan Christmas." The festivities will include Christmas trees fashioned out of shopping bags and a celebratory vegetarian meal. No cards and no wrapping paper, of course. Someone captured the spirit of this holiday program long ago, "Bah! Humbug!"

It's not an endorsement of every Christmas excess to appreciate merrymaking and gestures of generosity. After all, the Magi didn't necessarily have to travel, or offer their gifts of frankincense and myrrh. That they did points to the ultimate reason for the joyous celebration of the season. Merry Christmas!

# The Shoe Fairy Cometh...

Traditions, the backbone of families everywhere, are as varied as the many families celebrating them. Holidays and traditions bind families together and play an important role, especially to the children. The shoe fairy, not at all well-known, was part of my childhood and a tradition still held as a celebration of new shoes that when put under the bed would receive a fairy visit. My grandfather, owning leather pits in Turkey made the wearing of shoes

of great importance, an expense in the early 1900's that required special attention.

Not associated with leather pits, but never-the-less important, is the Holland tradition of the children leaving their shoes on the hearth where St. Nicholas can fill them with candies and small toys. A Santa's helper, not too well known in the United States, is Black Peter who was in charge of leaving switches for misbehaving children. Before the elves and tiny reindeer, Black Peter was the opposite of St. Nicholas or Sinterklaas, as he was known to the Dutch beginning his appearance in the 15th century. His dark appearance suggests a Spaniard reflecting the occupation of the Netherlands by Spain at that time as well as a pirate. It was not uncommon to tell children that they would be taken to a pirates' hideout and the stick and bag he held would insure a safe "passage" to this forbidden place.

As the political climate changed, Black Peter was often depicted as an Indian, an African, or a slave in tattered clothing. In parts of central Europe the character of Black Peter was more like a monster, but recently he has lost some of this grotesque persona and is dressed in a Renaissance page-style costume with short pants, stockings and a cap with a large feather. He still maintains the African connection, in blackface with gold earrings.

One cannot help to make a connection with the recent holiday story of Elf on a Shelf where a brightly colored stuffed elf is placed somewhere in the child's home to watch that they behave with a story that accompanies its role in keeping a child aware of its presence and the impending loss of gifts. Not to be left out of the tradition of watching out for "bad" children is the French equivalent of Black Peter, Father Whipper. Dressed in a black robe, Pere Fouettard is another direct opposite of Pere Noel, as Santa is known in France. While not as popular as in America, the tree is sold, as one to be planted later and in some homes lit with candles as was common in early 1900's in the United States. The Christmas tree has been a widespread tradition since England's Prince Albert, Queen Victoria's husband, introduced the custom in 1841. Not too far a distance from England is Scotland where Christmas was not celebrated until the 1960's! It was outlawed and considered just another workday. It is still not the major event that it is to



other countries, but New Year's Day is an important, celebrated holiday.

Germany, perhaps more than any other country, has influenced the way Christmas is celebrated around the world. It is from Germany that we get some of the most popular ideas associated with the season and the Christmas spirit. To start the season we have the advent calendar and wreaths marking

> the days until Christmas in a variety of artistic styles. The pine tree is considered a "must" for holiday decoration, sometimes as early as the day after Thanksgiving, in some homes lasting until January 6th. Known as Little Christmas or in some countries Three Kings Day, the day celebrates the 3 Magi, Melchior, Balthasar and Caspar having brought gifts to the Christ Child. Unlike Santa Claus, gifts in Germany are brought by the Christ kindle or Kris Kringle, a figure that embodies the Christ Child and not a pseudonym for Santa. Here he is accompanied by a nasty companion called Belznickle, dressed in somber-colored fur leaving switches and coal to the naughty boys and girls. It is in the middle Atlantic colonies that Belznickle makes his United States appearance.

The earliest ornaments consisted of containers of edible goodies, but the first commercial glass-blown ornaments introduced in Germany were decorated and did not contain things to eat. The gingerbread house, nutcrackers and the tradition of opening gifts on Christmas Eve all have their origin in Germany.

Switzerland is a nation with four official languages and thus has multiple Christmas traditions with no single approach, but all citizens in Switzerland - French, German, Italians and Swiss - celebrate with trees

> and mangers with bell-ringing competitions held throughout the country. In nearby Denmark Santa does not arrive alone. No indeed. There is a mysterious creature lurking about, dressed in grey with a red bonnet, red socks and white clogs. If he is not appeased with treats, he plays tricks, but if properly cared for, he watches over the family's animals for a year and when in Sweden a gnome must be appeased but his contribution is putting the presents under the tree.

The roots of Saint Nicholas began in Myra, Turkey when a young Greek boy was born in the

4th century to a very wealthy family.

His education was religiously grounded and at an early age he became a Bishop. Inheriting his family's wealth upon their death, he spent much of his life and wealth in charitable work. One story tells of an impoverished noble, father of three girls who was despondent at the thought of them being sent into servitude due to lack of a dowry. Nicholas upon hearing of this is said to have tossed a bag of gold through the window on three consecutive nights thus assuring the dowry for each of the girls. The bags appearing to be round and filled with gold has come to be associated with the pawnshop golden balls hanging outside their shop. Another story puts Nicholas on a ship being tossed about in the sea and with a wave of his arms, he calmed the waters, allowing the ship to sail in safety. This puts Nicholas in the position of the patron saint of sailors and Nicholas became known as the bearer-of-gifts.

From these beginnings, Christmas has become a blend of secular and religious traditions with the commercial phenomenon of the present-day holiday mixing them together. After all of the tinsel, needles, bows, wrapping paper and cookies have been all but forgotten, you can always put your new shoes under the bed.

This is a humanitarian venture that will also benefit others Potential bone marrow donors will be given a free swab test kit to see if they are potential donor matches for Amit Gupta, who was diagnosed with acute leukemia in September. Gupta, 32, of San Francisco, formerly from Woodbridge, is being treated here with chemotherapy, but doctors tell him he needs to find a bone marrow donor. All it takes to be a bone marrow donor is to give a blood transfusion. There is no pain involved. Amit Grupta There is no cost to those who register. Healthy people from areas such as South Asia, India, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, Nepal, Bangladesh are especially asked to attend. To be part of the program, potential donors must be 18 to 60 years old and in good general health. Those with asthma and are dependent on oral steroids, those who have back problems of the neck, spine and lower back and those who have cancer, except for some types of skin cancer, may not take part. Participants can't include those with diabetes and take insulin, those who have sleep apnea, have had a heart attack, coronary artery bypass, angioplasty or stent replacement, a peacemaker, arrhythmias, valve disease and blood clots or a stroke. Potential donors will be asked to complete a consent form to submit with the swab kit and will be contacted if they're able to join the match program. # **Give Creatively with Donor-advised Funds**

mericans are generous and contribute billions of dollars to charity each year, using a variety of methods. One creative way of gifting is through a donor-advised fund, a separately identified fund or account that is maintained and operated by a section 501(c)(3) charitable organization.

Donor-advised funds, which offer immediate tax benefits, are becoming increasingly attractive option for individuals, families and organizations looking for alternatives to direct giving or private foundations. With more than \$25.2 billion in assets and over 152,000 account holders in 2009, according to the National Philanthropic Trust, donor-advised funds are the fastest growing charitable giving vehicle in the U.S.

Donor-advised funds are usually offered by foundations, mutual fund groups, other financial firms and universities, who often partner with a charity on the offering.

By working through the public charity administrating the donor-advised fund, donors make irrevocable contributions to the fund, which then invests the money in an account the donor creates from a list of different mutual funds. Individuals can contribute to the account cash or appreciated assets, such as securities, cash or real estate.



Next, the donors make a recommendation, if they choose, on the grants the fund will issue to charity. The donor can also specify that the income and/or principal from the fund be available for distribution to charity.

While donors can recommend which charities should receive contributions, the fund makes the actual grants. This provision is often included in the gifting agreement and offers protection from gifts being allocated to inappropriate charities at the behest of the donor.

#### The benefits of donor-advised funds

The benefits donors receive from using donor-advised funds include the ability to donate a wide variety of assets, an immediate tax deduction, flexible grantmaking and the opportunity to create a legacy. The charitable assets can also be passed on to future generations to oversee and/or can be given directly to charitable organizations

Another advantage of donor-advised funds is that the donor does not incur the cost of establishing and administering a private foundation, making donor-advised funds appealing for people giving less than \$1 million. Many donor-advised funds require a minimum contribution of \$5,000 or \$10,000, and some funds may require a larger upfront contribution, whereas a private foundation can cost \$500,000 or more to establish.

Since the contributions are being made to a public charity, the donor receives an immediate tax deduction, including a deduction for a cash donation of up to 50% of the donor's adjusted gross income (AGI), or a deduction for securities and other appreciated assets of up to 30% of their AGI. Moreover, donors can avoid capital gains taxes on gifts of appreciated property and estate taxes, helping the investment in the fund grow tax-free.

When contributing assets to donor-advised funds, a donor can potentially give more to charity and pay less in taxes. The following example demonstrates the tax and giving advantages of contributing appreciated assets to a donor-advised fund. In this example, \$100,000 in long-term appreciated securities is being donated with a cost basis, or original purchase price of \$30,000.

If the donor sells the securities and donates the cash proceeds to charity, he or she will be subject to a capital gains tax of 15% of \$70,000, or \$10,500. That leaves the charity with \$89,500 of the securities' value. But if the donor contributes the \$100,000 of securities directly to a donor-advised fund, the charity receives the full amount of the donation. To receive the tax deduction, the donor must issue the gift by year end.

#### Possible drawbacks of donor-advised funds

Donor-advised funds do come with some limitations, such as the loss of complete control over the workings of the fund. And while the donor may provide suggestions about the distributions the institution makes from the fund, the recommendations are only advisory. However, most suggestions are followed by the administrating charity, but they are not obligated to do so.

In contrast, donors in private foundations can create their own board, pick investments from across the financial industry and give equally to foreign and domestic charities.

Other potential limitations of donor-advised funds include the management fees and the minimum investment requirements associated with the contribution. While the fees are low, (management fees are typically less than 1% plus other expenses associated with the investments), they are still something to consider for potential donors.

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


ing, and the twist at the very end of the last show blindsided me! -- Ann in Minnesota

#### "Other Desert Cities" by Jon Robin Baitz at the Booth Theatre on Broadway

Drop everything. "Other Desert Cities," the superb and deeply gratifying new play by Jon Robin Baitz, which just recently opened at the Booth Theatre in New York City, may possibly be the greatest thing that you will ever see onstage or even at the movies. At least, this is how I felt upon the conclusion this show and, while this reaction may seem hyperbolic, no doubt you will find something thrilling and enormously moving upon making a visit to "Other Desert Cities." Featuring a stellar cast, led by Stockard Channing and Stacy Keach, this play features its share of laugh-out-loud humor, as well as emotional tidal waves of feeling, but the playwright always seems to

have something surprising up his sleeve. Indeed, this family drama can suddenly shift gears and take a path that no one could see coming. But let's not give anything away. Suffice it to say, "Other Desert Cities" takes a theatergoer on quite a journey, both entertaining and full of pathos, and this play may stand as the must-see show of the season.

Actually, "Other Desert Cities" may be the must-see show of two different seasons. I'll explain. A Lincoln Center production, this play premiered Off-Broadway this past February to the kind of reviews that producers dream about and a transfer to a Broadway house seemed imminent. But, unfortunately, no available theatre was found and so this

show lingered in limbo for months. What's more, "Other Desert Cities" lost two of its actors—including one of my favorite performers, Linda Lavin—to other productions due to the delay in finding a theatre, so, upon arriving at the Booth, I didn't know quite what to expect. Happily, this play turned out to be even better than those early reviews would lead one to believe.

One of the best things about this show is its brilliant quintet of actors, directed with enormous sensitivity by frequent Baitz collaborator, Joe Mantello. Set at Christmas time in Palm Springs at the home of Polly and Lyman Wyeth (played by Stockard Channing and Stacy Keach), this play concerns the arrival of their writer daughter Brooke (Rachel Griffiths), who has come home for the holidays to present her tell-all manuscript about the Wyeth family's history of secrets before it is to be published. Also present are Brooke's brother Trip (Thomas Sadoski) and her alcoholic aunt Silda, played by Judith Light. Though this may sound like the makings of an all-too-familiar drama between generations and political viewpoints, this playwright is too smart for that, adding subtleties and shadings to his characters, making them all unique and deeply human.

In a cast in which all the parts are pretty much equal, Stockard Channing manages to stand out nonetheless. Played with a mixture of withering humor and unexpected generosity of spirit, Channing has not been this stellar and striking in years. Stacy Keach, as her husband, is equally good, combining the strength of being the patriarch of the family with the feeling that that façade could crumble at any given moment. As aunt Silda, the wonderful Judith Light gets all the best lines and, under any other circumstances, she would walk away with the show. Thomas Sadoski is terrific as the family member most designated to try to keep everything in balance and Rachel Griffiths, in a stunning Broadway debut, gives the most emotional performance, especially when reacting to the fallout of secrets in the second act.

We arrived on Thursday about 1:00 absolutely starving and we checked in and looked around for a great local place for lunch. We were told there was one place we HAD to go and that was the Dinosaur Bar-B-Que!

Founder John Stage began Dinosaur Bar-B-Que with two partners as a mobile concession unit in 1983 with a 55-gallon drum cut in half. The idea was hatched at the Harley Rendezvous, a massive motorcycle gathering near Albany, NY because they believed that bikers deserve a good plate of food. For five years the road was home, doing motorcycle shows, fairs, and festivals throughout the Northeast. Burned out from life on the

road, they settled in downtown Syracuse as a quick service lunch/ dinner bar-b-Que joint in 1988. In 1990 they tripled their size, adding a full bar, full service dining, and live music. Dinosaur Bar-B-Que opened its doors in Rochester, NY in 1998, Dinosaur Bar-B-Que Harlem followed in 2004 and the fourth location in Troy, NY opened on November 10, 2010.

The bar-b-Que has been nationally acclaimed as some of the best in the country. It has won honors for food and sauces in publications such as Men's Health and Eating Well magazines, won the Number 1 BBQ on Good Morning America and has been featured on

# Will You Be Gifting **This Season?**

Most certainly the holiday season is associated with gifts for loved ones, generally the kind that come wrapped and in a box. However, this is also the time of year when people consider making monetary gifts to family members. If you are feeling generous this year, the IRS allows you to gift \$13,000 to each family member. Here's how it works - each year, you can gift away money or other stuff worth up to \$13,000 to a single donee (gift recipient). If you are married, you and your spouse can jointly give away up to \$26,000

# Dollars

per donee. You don't have to pay any gift taxes, and your estate tax exemption remains intact.

While that definition may appear over and sense while that definition may appear over simplified, it is one of the most misunder-stood IBS rules. Most often someone will stood IRS rules. Most often, someone will ask, "How much will I save in taxes if I gift to my children"? The answer is nothing;

there is no tax benefit for the donor or the recipient. If you keep your annual gifting under the \$13,000 you are not required to file a gift tax return. The other end of the question is "Will my children have to pay tax if I gift them money"? No, they will not, if you stay within IRS gifting rules, there is no immediate tax benefit or liability.

However, making gifts of property to family members is a useful tool that may accomplish a variety of asset protection and estate planning objectives. A properly structured program of gift giving, to one's children or grandchildren, can result in a minimization of estate and income taxes and can also be useful for achieving a significant degree of lawsuit protection.

But what happens when you exceed that limit? You may have to file a federal gift tax return, using IRS Form 709. It's generally required if you made a gift worth over \$13,000 to an individual or several gifts to one individual that add up to more than \$13,000. Gifts above the \$13,000 annual limit are called "taxable gifts." Don't panic! You won't actually owe any federal gift tax unless your cumulative taxable gifts exceed your \$5 million lifetime gift tax exemption. But you must still file Form 709 if you made any taxable gifts, even when no tax is due.

What's ahead for Gifting in 2012? Prior to the Tax Relief, Unemployment Insurance Reauthorization & Job Creation Act (aka 2010 Act), your gifting could not exceed \$1million dollars during your lifetime or you would have to pay gift tax. In 2012 that number changes to a \$5 million lifetime exemption. Certainly this change is expected to have much political pressure to keep it at the one million levels and, it is expected to return to the one million levels in 2013. That makes 2012 an ideal time to consider gifting highly appreciated assets such as real estate as well as closely held family owned businesses. For this type of gifting it is recommended that you work with an attorney and or tax professional.

Large gifts made in 2012 are always scrutinized by IRS, what you may consider fair market value of real estate or a business may not be the same as the IRS's evaluation. In addition, gifting of assets can have serious negative implications in a long term care situation. Despite IRS rules of gifting, state Medicaid laws still have a five year look back for any gifting. The state looks for a pattern of gifting; gifting all of your assets and home to children on the onset of an illness will be subject to the look back period. Most financial advisors will be able to point you in the right direction for legal and tax advice for gifting.

Gil is a writer struggling with his novel in an age that doesn't seem to value the kind of writing he's passionate about. Gil takes to roaming the city at night and winds up in the 1920s, surrounded by the writers and artists of his favorite era.


It's more whimsical than cynical, and Wilson's awkward charm makes a perfect vehicle for Woody Allen. The romance of the film revolves **"Dolphin Tale" (PG)** -- While it may have some of the tone and outward trappings of a Hallmark Channel TV movie, this family film based on a true story is surprisingly watchable and uplifting. A boy finds a dolphin whose tail is caught in a crab trap, and he becomes the anchor of the group of people who make it their mission to bring it back to health.

The gags are slow-pitch -- even for kids -- and Harry Connick Jr. plays the handsomest marine biologist ever. This summer I saw "The Addams Family" (the musical) on Broadway with Brooke Shields and Roger Rees (of "Cheers") as Morticia and Gomez. Now that "Once Upon a Time" and "Grimm" are grabbing viewer attention, NBC has given "Pushing Daisies" creator Bryan Fuller the green light to develop a one-hour drama series about the Munsters. So, if you're too young to have seen "The Addams Family," "The Munsters" or even "Mr. Ed" -- it looks like you'll be seeing them again ... and again ... and again! \*\*\*


# Outing a Sore Spot for Nosey Dog



**DEAR PAW'S CORNER:** This weekend I took my dog "Marty," a dachshundbeagle mix, out to some property, where

I think she had her nose buried in the rocky soil for so long that she gave herself a rather large (maybe the size of a nickel) blister on her upper lip. It's not puffy -- just a raw patch under her nose, and she licks at it. I saw something saying that canola oil or olive oil might help chapped lips, but this seems like a larger area. Any tips? -- Matt P., via email

**DEAR MATT:** First, I have to caution that it's always wise to consult your dog's vet. With that out of the way, I'd say the best thing to do would be to treat the raw patch like you would a blister or a raw patch on your own nose. Keep the area clean, rub a bit of Neosporin over it











two or three times daily and watch it closely.

Marty probably will lick off the antibiotic ointment within a minute or two of application, but in such small quantities it isn't a problem to ingest. A Band-Aid probably will cause more discomfort and trouble than it prevents. You also can ask your vet for topical medicine to reduce any discomfort and thereby reduce her licking of the area so it can heal faster.

If it is indeed just a raw patch caused by friction, the area should heal up within a few days. But do keep a close eye on it: If the patch looks like its getting infected or otherwise changes for the worse, take Marty to the vet right away.
